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Hilary Hahn: Inspiration!

Hilary Hahn performed the Tchaikovsky Violin Concerto with the Tucson Symphony Orchestra on March 22, 2023. Her playing sparkled (as did her silver dress!) and she dazzled the audience with amazing fast passages and soaring, lyrical melodies. Tchaikovsky's concerto takes thirty five minutes to perform and it seemed to go by in a flash. After finishing the concerto, the audience gave her a rousing standing ovation, and she treated everyone to a movement of solo Bach as an encore. Hahn is an international violin soloist, performing solo recitals and

concertos with orchestras around the world. Hahn started Suzuki violin lessons shortly

before her fourth birthday, taking lessons at the Peabody Conservatory of Music in Baltimore. She became well known in the Suzuki community when she recorded Suzuki Violin Books 1-4 with pianist Natalie Zhu which were released in 2020. She has made 22 feature albums, several of which have been awarded Grammys.

With so many recordings of solo music, chamber music, and concertos with orchestra available, what is it about attending a live performance that makes it so special? The anticipation leading up to the concert, coming together to listen as a part of an audience, knowing that you are hearing a one of a kind performance unique to that moment? These and many other things for each listener contribute to the experience. For me, listening to a live performance allows me to be present in that moment, distraction free.

Hahn started a 100 day practice challenge project in 2017, in which she records and posts a clip of her practice on social media. She records these short, unedited clips wherever she happens to practice that day including in a hotel, on a jet or at home. When selecting the clips she said, "I make a point of not picking up the part of the practice that is impressive, I pick out the part that's the actual work, where I know I was in the zone, and I wasn't thinking about anything else." Part of her message for doing this is to be deliberate in what you do, no matter what else may be going on in life. February ECC Course in in Tucson


Suzuki teachers are aware that there is still so much of the population today that has no idea what the Suzuki method is all about. It is easy to lose track of this when one has a full studio or is teaching the Suzuki method at a school. It feels then like the whole world is just "Suzuki teaching". But it is important to always reach out

in whatever way possible to others who are new to the method or perhaps have never even heard about Dr. Shinichi Suzuki. He was the man who in the 1950's - 1960's started to explore the idea that children could learn music in the same way that children all over the world learn their own language. He called it the 'Mother Tongue' method. It was brought to the U.S in the 1960's and began to be applied to many other instruments besides violin.



I taught the ECC 8 hr. course on two Sunday afternoons in March at the Fred Fox School of Music, University of Arizona, sponsored by the Arizona Suzuki Association. Nine young college students were the participants - the next generation. They were inquisitive and willing to listen and I was ready to share the materials and my own experiences about how the Suzuki Method began, the way the Suzuki Triangle works, the importance of listening, moving in small steps, memorizing, delaying reading and more. It was inspiring for them when I played the Suzuki Association of the Americas videos of children performing and of Suzuki teachers discussing the method. It

was also fun to play a few of my own videos. One of my favorites to play is always the video of two 5 yr. old cellists at the end of one year of study playing a D scale with the rhythm of variation B and using the words: Mon-day (rest) and Tues-day (rest) etc. Now - when the participants decide to take more Suzuki training they will have finished the pre-requisite course ECC. I personally thank the Arizona Suzuki Association for offering/sponsoring this course and for providing scholarships to Arizona college and university students.



Book Club Suzuki: The Man and His Dream to Teach the Children of the World by Eri Hotta


Suzuki: The Man and His Dream to Teach the Children of the World was published in 2022. This book is of interest to all who are involved or interested in the Suzuki world, both educators and parents. The author Emi Hotta has extensive knowledge of Japanese history both as a professor and author and is also a Suzuki parent whose daughter studies Suzuki violin at the New York School for

the Arts.

Dr. Suzuki's life spanned almost the entire twentieth century. His life work founded on the conviction that all children possess tremendous capacity to learn is examined in detail. Hotta takes the reader from Suzuki's childhood working in his violin factory in Nagoya to his studies in Berlin between the two world wars to the beginnings of his teaching career in Tokyo in the 1930's seamlessly. The book is written in chronological order. It also includes info about how the Suzuki movement continues to grow even after Suzuki's death. Many who have read Suzuki's own writing, such as *Nurtured by Love*, will enjoy understanding the context of many of his stories.

On March 20, 2023, Eri Hotta was featured in a Suzuki in Action! Webinar hosted by SAA and Alfred Music. In this free online session, Eri discussed her book. She mentioned two chapters of special interest to all Suzuki practitioners which focus on the topics of tone and talent. Chapter 5 is titled "For the Sake of Beautiful Tone." She described the importance that Suzuki attached to the beauty of tone as "the leitmotif that guided his musical life." At age 17, Suzuki fell in love with the voice of the violin after hearing Mischa Elman's recording of Ave Maria. He let his ear be his guide when he went to Germany in search of a master teacher. Only after attending and listening to many concerts did find his master teacher, Klinger. In his teaching Suzuki believed that repetition in hearing beautiful things is crucial in music training. "No Suzuki Thing as Born Genius" is the title of Chapter 6. Suzuki redefines talent, not as something inborn such as eye color, but more like a muscle that can be trained to remarkable degrees. Suzuki's talent education movement is not exclusively for the talented, but for everyone. Every child has talent.

When asked why she wrote this book, Emi responded that Dr. Suzuki is a fascinating subject, having lived almost the entirety of the 20th Century. He lived through great historical turning points and encountered many intriguing characters including Einstein and Jimmy Carter. This book is written in a style that is thorough, yet easy to follow. I highly recommend this book to anyone interested in learning more about Suzuki's life and philosophy and it is a welcome addition to my musical library!



FIDDLING - The Basics and Beyond: Instruction for Players of Any Level by Patrick Clark and published by Hal Leonard

This is an excellent musical instruction manual for Suzuki individual or group lessons. I have found that children love to learn many fiddling favorites such as Boil the Cabbage Down, Cripple Creek and Soldiers Joy. Sixteen pieces are included with instructions. Each piece includes simple to more difficult parts, that are useful for groups with combined levels of advancement. Playing the fundamental rhythms of fiddle pieces not only enhances

the student's technical skills in the Suzuki repertoire but also improves reading skills. A CD is included.

*Patrick Clark grew up in Flagstaff, AZ where he earned a BM in violin performance at Northern Arizona University with Suzuki training, in 2006. He taught at the Nevada School for the Arts before moving to Nashville to play with various national artists such as Darius Rucker, Josh Gracin, Sara Evans and with groups on TV shows such as the Tonight Show, Good Morning America, and Dancing with the Stars. Patrick and his family currently live in Flagstaff.



Remembering Suzuki Bass Pioneer Dr. Dan Swaim

The string bass world lost a giant last month. Dr. Dan Swaim passed away peacefully at his home with his family by his side on April 4th, 2023. He was known simply as "Doc" to all of his students and his passing leaves a big hole in the lives of the people who knew him.

I met Doc back in 1980 when I was a high school student. He became my private lesson teacher and helped me become a better student. I studied with him briefly in college but then put the bass down to focus on my engineering studies. We lost touch after that until 15 years later when I read an article about him in a Suzuki Method newsletter. He had developed the


Suzuki Bass Method. By then, I was married and had four young boys. They had been studying Suzuki violin and I didn't realize there was a Suzuki Bass teacher in our own state. Eventually, all four of my boys would study with Doc through their senior year in high school.

Dan began developing Suzuki Bass Methodology in 1988 when he joined Suzuki Association of the Americas. In 1993, he became Suzuki's first Bass Teacher Trainer. He was widely recognized as a presenter at many conferences for Suzuki, the Music Educators National Conference, The International Society of Bassists, and the American String Teachers Association (ASTA). He was also honored to serve as faculty at the 13th World Suzuki Method Conference in Matsumoto, Japan in 1999 again at the 16th in Massimo Japan in 2013. His success with young bass students is widely recognized, locally, nationally and internationally. He was recognized by ASTA as the Outstanding Studio Teacher of the Year in 2009. The International Society of Bassists selected him for the Special Recognition

Award in the Young Bassists Ambassador category in 2017. Many of his former students now perform professionally in symphony orchestras including Atlanta, Cleveland, Milwaukee, New Mexico, Philadelphia, Phoenix Symphony, the Arizona Opera, and others. Some former students brought their children to study in his Suzuki Bass Studio and they also have gone on to play professionally. An esteemed colleague described him as quiet and strong with tons of loyalty for his students.

He will be greatly missed.
